Mocking any of the rituals of Islam, embracing misleading ideas or beliefs, or practicing forbidden religious rituals. 2. Insulting the state or its symbols. 3. Intentionally damaging or sabotaging any of the school's equipment, property, or facilities, such as: electrical tools, computers, operating machines, laboratories, and the school bus. 4- Using and benefiting from forged or official documents or seals in a legally illegal manner. 5- Harassment. 6. Blackmailing male or female students by photographing them or drawing insulting them and publishing it on the Internet. 7. Setting a fire inside the school. 8 Possessing, using, or threatening male and female students with firearms or the like, such as knives, sharp tools, and bullets, without a gun. 9.
